

COVID-19 Key Facts in Brief - per September 14, 2020

- To curb the spread of COVID-19, Indonesia introduced a semi-lockdown scheme called Large Scale Social Restriction (PSBB). This is not executed at national level but applied upon request of province and/or region to the Ministry of Health.
- DKI Jakarta has implemented PSBB since April 10, 2020. The Provincial Government had been extended multiple times with some relaxations (also known as *PSBB Transisi*) in recent months. However, due to the increased infection rate and decreasing hospital capacity in the region, the Provincial Government decided to return to full-scale PSBB starting today, September 14, 2020.
- Only governmental bodies, SOEs, and 11 business sectors are allowed to open their offices during PSBB in DKI Jakarta with strict health protocol and physical distancing.
- Bogor, Depok and Bekasi continue to implement a proportional PSBB until September 29, 2020.
- Tangerang continue to implement a proportional PSBB until September 20, 2020.
- Everyone is obliged to wear face mask outside their home in PSBB regions including Jakarta and West Java. Violations will subject to penalty – please refer to local regulation for more details.
- Foreign nationals are not allowed to enter Indonesia during the pandemic period with exemptions to permanent and limited stay permit holders and family, diplomatic visa holders, foreign workers for national strategic projects, and supports for food, medical and humanitarian purposes. They must bring a negative result of COVID-19 PCR test (with 7 days- validity) along with other documents.
- Domestic travel will be based on the Minister of Transportation Regulation no. 41 (2020) and its supporting circulars issued on June 8, 2020. Also, Exit-Entry Permit Letter (SIKM) is **not applicable** for now. Nevertheless, intercity travel will be based on the COVID-19 Task Force Circular no. 9 (2020) which requires non-reactive rapid test result or negative PCR test result which is valid for 14 days on the day of departure, or letter of influenza-like illness free issued by hospital/*Puskesmas* doctor for regions where rapid test and PCR test are not available.
- Even-Odd policy for private vehicles will not be applied during PSBB in DKI Jakarta. However, the number of passengers is limited to 2 people per row except for those with the same home address.
- In terms of public transportation in DKI Jakarta, limitation of operational hours and restriction on maximum capacity up to 50% are applied.
- Online and conventional *ojek* (commercial transport) in DKI Jakarta are allowed to operate with strict health protocol.
- DG of Immigration has resumed services for expatriates since July 13, 2020. Holder of expired stay permit in Indonesia must apply for a renewal by September 20, 2020 or leave the country. For those who are still abroad, renewal must be made before December 31, 2020.
- School year in Indonesia started on July 13, 2020. RI Government has allowed face-to-face learning for high schools in green zones (app. 6% of Indonesian students) on June 15, 2020. Primary schools may be opened this month but subject to parents' approval. All schools in red (DKI Jakarta is included) and yellow zones will continue with learning from home.
